PROGRAM OVERVIEW

STEPSS is a program for students ages 18-21 years old who have met state graduation requirements, but continue to need more time and skill development before entering independent or interdependent adulthood. Members of the IEP team recommend students based on data, file review, transition goals, and the transition plan. Our program provides a welcoming culture where students are respected and treated as partners in the process of increasing independence.


THE STEPSS TEAM
